4. Brief Board Announcements

- a. Resignation of Board Member Paula Peng. Prior to resigning from the Neighborhood Council, Boardmembers Paula Pang along with Jared Westin were suspended and subsequently removed from the Board by the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment as a result of failing to complete their mandatory trainings.
 b. Open Board Seat- Organizational Representative 1 (Term Ending 2023) Therefore

- c. Possible Return to In-Person Meetings beginning October I can foresee or my announcement is based on the passage of recent legislation AB 361. Michael Lynn-I know that actually the rule for the open board seats are that we need to post it on the website and they need to complete that within 10 days of the meeting or prior so, in other words the cutoff date for the applications for those seats will be 10 days before the next meeting, so that would be our next meeting which is October 19 if I am not mistaken, or actually October 21st so the 11th of October is the cut off, but we'll be posting those seats tomorrow. Okay, and Freddie do you have an answer for Barry?

I was Culver City born and raised so I know my neighborhoods, but yeah, I'm just here saying hi. Maybe next month I'll bring more legislative updates, but you know our office there's a lot of casework I don't know what Jamie has explained to you about what you know we can offer but, again, the receipt agencies DMV, Caltrans Franchise Tax Board I know a lot of people been calling haven't received checks, but unfortunately it can be up to a whole month for a lot of people to get that direct deposit but again. All of our staff are on our website so you could just go to my boss's website, if you want to contact us individually or you can use our contact form but glad to be here. Again, unfortunately don't really have many updates provide but you know I'm here to lend my ear and then you know help where I can but state agencies that's what we're able to help out with, so thank you everybody.
- g. Office of County Supervisor Mitchell (Sargsyan)- Good evening everyone Thank you so much for the special invitation for me to attend tonight's meeting. If you don't mind, I might take a little more than two minutes because I do have quite a few updates that I wanted to share with you tonight. So, I'll just jump right into it the first one is the county. is looking for input from our community members in measure H strategies, so the Board of Supervisors has actually called for a reassessment of the homeless initiative strategies and throughout the next month of the counties of homeless initiative will be hosting a number of Community input meetings. The one

for SPA 5 will take place on Thursday, October 21 in the morning at 9:00AM if you're interested in participating. I'm sure you can find the invitation on the county's homeless initiative website or vou're welcome to email me directly, and I can share with you the invitation. My email address if you don't have it is ASargsyan@Boslacounty.gov. Secondly, I wanted to announce that last week the Board of Supervisors passed a landmark motion to phase out oil drilling and protect our communities and frontline workers. As you all may be aware, LA County has a large number of both active and idle oil wells in unincorporated LA County alone there's 1600 active and idle oil wells, and our communities live in very close proximity and sometimes our neighbors don't even realize how close they live to those oil wells, and so, with this landmark motion, LA County will become the first in the nation to ban existing oil drilling and transition fossil fuel workers to careers and clean energy and other climate friendly industries, and that was a motion by Supervisor Mitchell and co-authored by Supervisors Kuehl and Hahn. Thirdly, the eviction moratorium in the county is ending on September 30 However, the Board will consider an extension to the moratorium next Tuesday during the board meeting on September 28 there will be four different areas of protections of that the Board will be discussing. The landlord and tenant back rent applications to get back rent from assistance those applications must be, however, submitted by September 30 because, due to State law were unable to extend that and then, in terms of our small businesses, our office is hosting a commercial leasing webinar on Wednesday October 6th at 5:30PM on Zoom and it is an opportunity for small business owners with commercial leases to gain assistance on how to renegotiate their lease and know their rights as tenants. Again, if you have any interest in participating feel free to send me an email directly and I can share with you all this information. If I have more time, there is another exciting opportunity wanted to announce for our youth. Those between the ages of 16 and 24 who are interested in becoming life guards. The career actually that LA County lacks a lot of lifeguards this year, we had a crisis of not having enough and so starting September 27, county parks will be holding a free training program for those interested between those ages 16 and 24 to become a lifeguard. Not only is the program including training, but swimsuit swim cats and every other equipment will be provided free of charge. The locations are three different areas in our district, and to register, you may visit parks.la county.gov/lifeguard-ready-training again happy to share the flier with you via email or you may also visit mitchell.la county.to be, I believe all this information is also available on our website. And then, lastly, for our veteran community our veterans and their families, there is a an event that will be hosted on October 22 in Compton specifically, this is our second supervisor district event hosted by veteran pure access network la veterans collaborative and village for events and the event is dedicated to the well-being of our veterans and their families housing for health will be providing COVID 19 vaccines and booster shot, there will be free food and grocery gift card giveaways a lot of other organizations and veteran centered organizations and resources will be provided, if you have any questions want to get more information, please email me and I will be happy to share with you the flyer I know I'm over time I'm so sorry.

h. Department of Neighborhood Empowerment (Cupen-Ames)- Perfect I'm going to keep it short and sweet because I'll email the rest to you. For the code of conduct. As you know, there's a draft that was sent by our general manager on July of this

year to the Board of Neighborhood Commissioners. Currently, that draft is has four different session dates, two of them already passed and two others upcoming. For feedback from the public and Boardmembers on these proposed amendments to the Code of Conduct policy Tuesday October 19 from 630 to 8:30pm. Saturday November 6 from one to 3pm I will email you the link to look at to sign up for that session so sessions and provide the necessary feedback. Also, this coming Saturday, is the Congress of neighborhoods it will be from 8am to 3:45pm with an extraordinary number of webinars or meetings that will provide online education and networking. Through this year's theme, leading to change together so I'd highly recommend you go to neighborhoodcongress.la to sign up and register for this Saturday's congress of neighborhoods. For those Boardmember's Cornerstone having technical challenges and the need to more accurately track training records in the future to department needs to update your cornerstone credentials your username and password. You will soon receive a new username and a temporary password when you receive this notification, please update your temporary password to a secure password of your choosing once you receive your new username your current username will no longer work. This update will not affect your transcripts and you won't have to retake training you already completed. We will send you subsequent reminders and updates to ensure the smoothest transition possible and apologize for the inconvenience. Now the CORE Institute training modules. Now the digital media policy is is has been in draft since September 29 of last year has been edited again a July of this year. It is currently being considered for the Board Neighborhood Commissioners and still taking feedback and comments from Boardmembers and members of the public with regards to digital media policy. Please don't hesitate to keep providing your feedback, as necessary, if you have not done so already and, last but not least, the LA City Council redistricting Commission. If you go to their website, LACCRC2021.org, you will see their upcoming meetings, but they currently have a draft map of the new boundaries for these districts, they have not put any numbers on that they've only put letters. I would highly recommend you go to our website to see that draft; they will be providing sessions in October two different sessions to provide comments on the first draft of their map and there have been some substantial changes to some of those districts, so I would recommend you visit and please input.

Background

The Los Angeles Department of Transportation periodically opens its application portal for residents to submit requests for the installation of speed humps on local streets. Speed humps have been proven to improve the safety of residential areas, and the department's implementation criteria ensures that they will not be installed over community objection or in a way that can hinder response vehicles. The department's existing application process caps the number of requests that can be received during any one application period, and any applications submitted after that quota is reached will not be considered, regardless of those streets' merit.

South Robertson in particular has several major thoroughfares running through and adjacent to its boundaries, causing several residential streets to face increased cut through traffic at dangerous speeds. Capping the number of applications at a low figure effectively pits regions of Los Angeles against each other, and could cause crucial residential areas to not be considered.

The current application process also does not provide neighborhood councils with any formal process to submit requests, which prevents entities such as SORO from conducting community outreach to help determine which streets should be submitted or considered. It instead requires individuals to submit individual streets for consideration, which could lead to duplicative requests and inadvertently disadvantage communities with fewer resources.

Proposed Motion

I. The South Robertson Neighborhoods Council (SORO NC) shall submit a letter to LADOT, Councilmember Paul Koretz, and Councilmember Mark Ridley-Thomas requesting the department commit to reopening the Speed Hump Application Program in the first quarter of 2022 with a firm date, commit to fully funding the program and expanding the number of applications they will accept, and provide a way for Neighborhood Councils to formally submit requests.





Considerations

We the South Robertson Neighborhoods Council (SORO) encourage the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (LADOT) and the city to commit to opening the speed hump application as soon as possible, and to commit to a time period no later than the first quarter of 2022. Speed humps are a proven way to make local streets safer for residents, and are a cost effective measure. LADOT's design criteria ensures that they are installed in a safe and effective manner with minimal impact on major thoroughfares and emergency response vehicles, and requires two-thirds support from local residents to ensure they are not installed over community opposition.

Past application rounds have arbitrarily capped the number of applications that can be received and evaluated, which hinders the ability of neighborhoods to have high need streets evaluated. This also effectively pits neighborhoods against each other, as one neighborhood could submit a large number of requests when the application opens. South Robertson in particular is bisected by several major commuting thoroughfares, which leads to an outsized amount of cut-through traffic on our local residential streets, which could benefit tremendously from speed humps. The city's existing application process also does not provide organizations such as neighborhood councils with a process to submit formal applications, which limits our ability to help coordinate within our community and to conduct community outreach to help inform the application process.

We request that the city commit to opening the speed hump application process in the first quarter of 2022, that the city fully fund the 2022 cycle and increase the number of applications it will consider, and that the city provide organizations such as neighborhood councils with an additional path to submitting applications on behalf of their geographic jurisdictions.

In response to the COVID-19 crisis, the Los Angeles Department of Transportation focused its resources on essential COVID related service requests. While that was understandable at the time that the stay at home emergency order was declared, the portal has now been closed for non-Covid related requests for over a year and a half. During this time the city implemented an extensive street repaying program to take advantage of the lack of traffic, despite the fact that this was not an essential COVID related service.

Now with the widespread availability of vaccines, and effective social distancing, the department should be able to safely evaluate and implement non-essential COVID service requests, especially now that businesses and employers have begun more regular service.

The South Robertson Neighborhoods Council (SORO NC) shall submit a letter I. to the Los Angeles Department of Transportation requesting that the department reopen its service request portal for non-Covid related service requests as soon as possible.

The Los Angeles Department of Transportation online Service Portal request has been closed since March 2020, with "COVID-related service requests" being prioritized, and non-COVID related requests unable to be submitted. While prioritizing COVID-related requests during the height of the COVID emergency was understandable and the right decision at the time, the service portal has now been closed for over a year and a half, preventing many residents from being able to submit vital service requests. As businesses and employers begin offering increasingly regular services, it is important that the city be able to respond quickly and effectively to service requests.

The city began an extensive road repaving program in 2020 to take advantage of decreased traffic to minimize disruptions. This demonstrates that the department has been able to balance COVID and non-COVID related services, and has been able to do so safely over the last year. With widespread availability of vaccines and proper social distancing, the department has shown that it is possible to complete non-COVID related services in a safe manner without undermining essential COVID related services by the department.

Background

The Los Angeles Department on Disability is responsible for evaluating Accessible Parking Zone Blue Curb Investigation applications, which determines if a blue curb should be installed within the city. The current application process heavily relies on a physical application, which requires several steps from a population with limited mobility. The application is currently only available in English and Spanish, with no other existing language options. The existing application is also difficult to locate on the Department's website, with links to it from other departments resulting in nonfunctioning dead links.

The South Robertson Community has multiple existing and planned eldercare facilities, which are heavily burdened by a cumbersome application process and would benefit from a more streamlined application. South Robertson is also home to significantly sized Hebrew and Farsi speaking communities, and expanding the language options for the application would make it more accessible and match what other departments and agencies already provide.

Proposed Motion

The South Robertson Neighborhoods Council (SORO NC) shall submit a letter to the Los Angeles Department on Disability, Councilmember Paul Koretz, and Councilmember Mark Ridley-Thomas requesting the department create an online portal for Accessible Parking Zone Blue Curb Investigation Applications, provide more language options for applications, and coordinate with other departments to update nonfunctioning links to the application.

We the South Robertson Neighborhoods Council (SORO) encourage the Los Angeles Department on Disability to update its Accessible Parking Zone Blue Curb Investigation Application to be more accessible to residents. The current system requires potential applicants to complete and manually send in a PDF file from the department's website, which is a severe limitation for households with limited connectivity or lacking access to a printer. An online portal similar to service request portals used by other city departments would make the program much more accessible, and would provide an additional option for residents to utilize.

The Department's website currently displays applications available in only English and Spanish, which causes an additional hurdle to households that primarily speak other languages. South Robertson in particular has significantly sized Hebrew and Farsi speaking immigrant communities, as well as multiple existing or planned eldercare facilities within its jurisdiction. Limiting the number of language options for applications artificially reduces the accessibility of the program, and makes it more difficult for immigrant populations to access.

Links to the existing application program from other city departments also appear to be nonfunctional. The primary link to the blue curb application from the Los Angeles Department of Transportation leads to a Page Not Found message, requiring residents to manually search for the application on the Department of Disability's site. This could effectively discourage residents from submitting an application, and causes additional hurdles to submit an application.

We request the Department of Disability create an online portal as an additional option for residents to submit applications, increase the number of language options available for applications, and coordinate with other departments to fix nonfunctional links to the existing application.





The following facts and existing conditions compel immediate action by the City to enforce all existing, enforceable laws prohibiting the blockage of the public right of way, including, but not limited to blockages in or near homeless encampments on the Westside of Los Angeles, including all applicable provisions of the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA):

Homeless encampments are pervasive in all neighborhoods on the Westside of Los Angeles including: Bel-Air–Beverly Crest, Brentwood, Del Rey, Mar Vista, Pacific Palisades, Palms, South Robertson, Venice, Westchester-Playa, West L.A.-Sawtelle, Westside, and Westwood.



Background

The Westside Regional Alliance of Councils (WRAC) has a Motion that has been approved by 7 other Neighborhood Councils.

The following facts and existing conditions compel immediate action by the City to clean up, abate, and correct unsafe and unsanitary conditions that are commonly found in homeless encampments on the Westside:

Homeless encampments are pervasive in all neighborhoods on the Westside of Los Angeles including: Bel-Air–Beverly Crest, Brentwood, Del Rey, Mar Vista, Pacific Palisades, Palms, South Robertson, Venice, Westchester-Playa, West L.A.-Sawtelle, Westside, and Westwood. Venice has the second largest homeless population in the City of Los Angeles after Skid Row.

Various items of trash, open containers of spoiled and rotting food, human waste, detritus, and other hazardous materials are commonly found in homeless encampments, which materials attract rats, cockroaches, and other disease-carrying vermin, and which cause significant health hazards, can be found in homeless encampments on the Westside. Sanitary facilities, including toilets, handwashing sinks, showers, running water, and soap are not readily available at most homeless encampments. As a result, human waste, excrement, urine, filth, and other biohazard materials are commonly found deposited on public sidewalks, streets, alleys, parkways, and on bluffs, hillsides and beaches in or near homeless encampments.

The Los Angeles City Bureau of Sanitation ("LA Sanitation") had previously instituted "Operation Healthy Streets" and the "CARE Program" to conduct a "robust homeless community outreach program," to provide information and services to homeless individuals and to clean encampments in the Skid Row area and other neighborhoods of Los Angeles that are "hit hardest" by homelessness. These existing unsafe, unsanitary, and unhealthy conditions pose a significant and immediate risk to public health and safety, not only to those individuals living in these encampments but also to neighboring residents, and the general public, including, but not limited to the spread of disease, contamination, and infection, including COVID-19, due to the unsanitary, unsafe, crowded, and unhealthy conditions found in these homeless encampments.

Proposed Motion

For the South Robertson Neighborhoods Council to officially support the WRAC Motion to call on the Los Angeles City Council and Mayor Eric Garcetti to immediately direct the Los Angeles City Bureau of Sanitation ("LA Sanitation") to





undertake site clean-ups, trash collection, and sanitizing of all homeless encampments located in the neighborhoods represented by WRAC on the Westside of Los Angeles, in order to abate, correct, and remove hazardous, unsafe, unhealthy, and unsanitary conditions at all homeless encampments forthwith.

Background

Everyday in Los Angeles, more people become homeless than leave homelessness. Over 25% of LA County's homelessness population are living in cars, vans or RVs/campers. For this population, safe parking sites offer a safe and legal place to sleep with access to services that can help them transition out of homelessness and into permanent housing.

Safe Parking LA, the organization that operates the safe parking sites, typically only allows vetted clients to park at the sites between the hours of 9PM and 6AM; the hours of operation can vary depending on the type of site being used. LAUSD parking lots are unused during these hours, so Safe Parking LA could run these sites with little to no noticeable impact on the schools.

South Robertson Neighborhoods Council

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Proposed Motion

The SORO NC shall send a letter to council members Koretz and Ridley-Thomas requesting that they pursue an MOU with LAUSD to establish safe parking sites in public school parking lots to be run by Safe Parking LA during the night time, when the parking lots are not otherwise in use. The letter will recommend that Hamilton High School be used for a pilot program.

Dear Councilmembers,

We, the South Robertson Neighborhoods Council, recommend that the Los Angeles City Council pursue an MOU with LAUSD to use public school campuses as safe parking sites for the homeless. Furthermore, we recommend that Hamilton High School be used as a pilot school for this program.

Over 16,000 of LA County's homeless population are living in cars, vans, or RVs/campers. They represent over 25% of the county's homeless population. For these families and individuals, it can be difficult to find a safe and legal place to park their cars at night.

Safe Parking LA operates safe parking lots that provide individuals a safe place to park each night, restroom access, a security guard, and social service resources.² As of 2021, there are 10 Safe Parking LA sites. These sites have connected 361 of their clients to case management services, which has led to 49 clients gaining employment and 88 transitioning into housing.³ Because Safe Parking LA requires that their clients have operational vehicles and only allows them to park on site at night, between the hours of 9PM and 6AM with some variance between sites, their clients are people who typically "have somewhere to be during the day and are productive members of society", according to program director, Emily Uyeda Kantrim.⁴

Some of our community members and stakeholders have visited a Safe Parking LA site and have reported that: the site is quiet and barely noticeable; most vehicle dwellers are employed; and no drugs or alcohol are allowed. These sites are a temporary haven for people who have recently lost their homes while they are finding a more permanent solution.

LAUSD parking lots, which are unused during Safe Parking LA's operational hours, can be used as safe parking sites to service some of the 16,000 unhoused Angelenos who are currently living in their vehicles, which is why we are asking City Council to pursue an MOU with LAUSD to use these parking lots as sites for the Safe Parking LA program.

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Motion to Submit a Letter to the Los Angeles Department of Transportation, CD 5, and CD 10 Supporting the Roofed Bus Shelter Model With Additional Amenities

Background

The city of Los Angeles is nearing the conclusion of its 20 year contract with its bus shelter provider, and is in the process of developing a successor program. The program aims to increase the number of bus shelters from 1,900 to over 3,000 citywide. The goal of this new program is to provide better amenities, such as WiFi connectivity, digital real time bus arrival information, and soft lighting, among others.

With the arrival of the Purple Line Extension in coming years, north-south transit ridership in particular will most likely increase in the South Robertson Area, and major transit corridors currently exist on La Cienega, Wilshire, Olympic, and Pico. 2020 Census data shows that parts of SORO have up to 18% of households car free, meaning that a significant portion of our residents rely on transit. WiFi connectivity, digital real time arrival information, and solar power in particular would be useful amenities for the SORO area, as it would provide riders with more accurate information while taking a minimal amount of sidewalk space.

The pilot largely focused on a roofed shelter model and a "blade" model. The "blade" option appears to provide inadequate shelter and amenities, and would require riders to manually place and hold it to block the sun and wind. This would be an undue burden for elderly passengers and individuals with mobility limitations, and would provide little to no benefits during poor weather conditions.

Proposed Motion

I. The SORO NC shall The South Robertson Neighborhoods Council (SORO NC) shall submit a letter to the Los Angeles Department on Disability, Councilmember Paul Koretz, and Councilmember Mark Ridley-Thomas expressing support for the roofed bus shelter pilot models, with digital timetables, WiFi, and solar power as additional amenities, as well as voicing a preference for the roofed shelter model over the "blade" option.

Dear Los Angeles Department of Transportation,

We the South Robertson Neighborhoods Council (SORO) support the department's plan to increase the number of bus shelters citywide, as well as its plan to increase and improve the amenities available for waiting transit riders. The recent bus shelter pilot models show how riders could have much better amenities than what currently exists, and the new Sidewalk and Transit Amenities Program (STAP) could make transit ridership a more pleasant and consistent experience for riders.

While we applaud the department taking advantage of the expiring contract to solicit new shelter models, we strongly believe that the roofed options far surpassed the "blade" option in its useability for riders. The roofed options provide sufficient shelter from inclement weather, comfortable seating, and the options for additional amenities. The "blade" option provides little to no benefit for riders, and could be inaccessible for elderly riders and individuals with mobility limitations. It could also fail to protect riders from inclement weather conditions, in particular strong winds and rain. We request that the department prioritize the roofed bus shelter options, and to not use the "blade" option as a lower cost alternative. Given the strong track record of the existing program's ability to raise sufficient revenue to provide maintenance, the department should be able to provide adequate and roofed shelter options without a negative budgetary impact, and to provide sufficient maintenance support for malfunctioning and vandalized infrastructure.

We also strongly support the department's choice to pursue additional amenities for riders. While all of the amenity options have merit, we believe that WiFi Connectivity and digital real time arrival information would particularly serve SORO residents, along with solar power to support these amenities. WiFi Connectivity will allow riders to conduct work and stay better connected while waiting for a connecting bus, and mirrors Metro's ongoing initiative to provide WiFi on all transit routes and buses in its fleet. Digital timetables will provide riders with accurate arrival information to better inform commutes, and solar power will allow these bus shelters to have a minimal impact on local supporting infrastructure.

SORO will soon have access to the first phase of Metro's Purple Line Extension La Cienega Station, and currently has access to several major transit thoroughfares through the Expo Line and BRT along Wilshire Boulevard. With the advent of Next Gen Bus, the Purple Line, and planned rapid transit corridors, it is imperative that the city provide adequate amenities for transit riders, both to improve the ridership experience and to attract new potential riders. We strongly encourage the department to emphasize the roofed bus shelter options, and support the inclusion of WiFi connectivity, digital real time arrival information, and solar power to support these amenities.
