Background

The project applicant and representative presented this proposed haul route to the Land Use and Economic Development (LUED) committee at their January 07, 2019 meeting. The applicant's request is for a Categorical Exemption for a haul route for the export of approximately 11,538 cubic yards of earth in conjunction with a previously-approved 5-story, 23-unit multi-family building with 2 levels of subterranean parking.

The subject property is located at 1416-1418 S Beverly Dr, two lots south of the commercial properties along Pico Blvd. The proposed haul route is described in applicant's map. Dirt will not be hauled from the site on Saturdays or Sundays.

The applicant noticed residents within 500 feet of the property for the LUED meeting. There were no residents in attendance.

Background

The City of Los Angeles contains over 1,000 active oil wells and 80% are located within 2,500 feet of a sensitive land use, impacting residents, students, and workers.

The neighborhood drilling threatens the health and safety of those living along the fence line of these oil wells.

The oil and gas extraction sites routinely use and emit as byproducts toxic chemicals that are known carcinogens, endocrine disruptors, and are harmful to multiple organ systems. These include but are not limited to formaldehyde, hydrochloric acid, hydrofluoric acid, naphthalene, xylene, benzene, and volatile organic compounds.
