Full Proposal

Metro PCS proposes to install an unmanned cell substation on the roof of 1830 S. Robertson (a commercial building). The equipment will consist of 6 panel antennas and 3 dishes. The equipment would be screened by 6' boxes, painted to match the building and resemble chimneys. The boxes would be visible from the street and surrounding properties.

The project would also remove one parking spot from the rear of the building to make room for an equipment cabinet. The remaining three spots would be slightly more narrow.

The Land Use committee voted to support the project, with the condition that the applicant provide a Certificate of Occupancy for the building's School of Nursing.



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Motion to consider a letter of support for the Adas Torah Temple project with Zone Variances to convert Victory Furniture on 9040 W. Pico blvd. to an Orthodox Jewish Synagogue

Full Proposal

Adas Torah Temple is requesting a letter of support to the ZA for their project with Zone Variances. Adas Torah, an orthodox Jewish synagogue is seeking a zone variance to (i) reduce required parking from 113 to 8 spaces and (ii) continue to have reduced back up space for cars exiting the southerly parking area for the adaptive reuse of the former Victory Furniture building located at 9040 W. Pico Blvd. – The authority of the ZA approval will be based on the strict no- drive rules pertaining to Sabbath and high holidays. Will double 2 of the parking spaces as a loading zone space. Applicant is the owner of the property.

The existing one story, 12,000 sq ft building on five parcels totaling 19,223 sq ft will increase to approximately 15,000 sq ft for the building footprint while maintaining the one story height. A planned worming kitchen of approximately 400 sq ft is included within the building footprint. Parking in the front yard along Pico will be eliminated in order to create an open area courtyard with a perimeter enclosure. Parking accessed from the alley to the south will be maintained. The secured main entrance will be accessed from Pico blvd with no walk ins permitted. There is no need for signage, but will have donor identification signage on the perimeter enclosure.

Adas Torah seeks to relocate its existing neighborhood-serving synagogue in the shortest possible time from the Beverlywood area to the Pico Robertson area. The synagogue has approximately 115 member families - predominantly young couples with young children totaling approximately 460 people. The growth plan is projected to increase from 115 families to 180 families in the next 3-5 years. They conducted outreach in a radius mailing consisting of 471 mailers. Construction could start as soon as Spring 2013 if the outreach and entitlement process is well received.

Everyday morning Services are from 6:30 to 7:30am. They will have 3 full time staff at the facility. The Synagogue will generally be empty from 9:00am to 5:00 pm M-F.

LUED Committee recommends support of project as presently provided with the developer and Synagogue having a representative (point person) with a telephone number to handle any issues. Also have scheduled meeting with neighbors quarterly through out the project.

Dear SORO Board and SORO Members.

Due to tight budget constraints, Canfield is applying for a Neighborhood Project Grant because we can no longer support on our own the Fresh Fruit on Friday program at our school. For about the last seven years we have had financial support on and off from The Model Neighborhood Program and SORO. Last year we tried to fund the program ourselves but did not have the necessary resources and went without a program for most of the school year.

Our student body at Canfield is comprised of an ethnically, linguistically, and socio-economically diverse population. We have a significant religious population of students that used to attend private schools but because of the tough economic times the parents now send their kids to Canfield, their local public school.

27% of our student body is designated to be economically disadvantaged as determined by the free/reduced price of the Federal Lunch Program. Unfortunately this is not enough to qualify us for Title One status which would automatically increase funding for our school. It becomes difficult to fund these special programs, when we must use our resources to pay for the basics such as text books and teachers.

Our success in changing our student's habit from eating unhealthy to eating healthy is primarily due to this program and the general atmosphere we have been able to establish of the importance of positive self- image and physical well being. Also good nutrition is strongly linked to high academic performance which has probably made it easier to achieve our educational goals. Should we receive funding from SORO, we will enter into a full partnership between staff, parents, students and community to totally support and implement this very important program which we will call **Farm to School.**

Summary

The Castle Heights Elementary School is requesting \$1671 to help them pay for their "Earth Week" and "Eco Fair" to be held April 21th to April 26th 2013.

Full Proposal

Each year, around Earth Day in April, Castle Heights Elementary School conducts "Earth Week" ending in their weekend "Eco-Fair". This week -long event sensitizes the students and their families to the importance of taking care of their environment and educates students and families on specific measures they can take to be responsible stewards of the earth. Events that take place during the week are: a kick-off assembly, Bottles and Cans Recycling Contest, E-Waste Drive School Beautification Day, and Walk-Bike to School Program. The Eco Fair examines organic food and gardening in their learning garden, sells reusable grocery bags, eco-themed t-shirts, and culminates in the E-Waste and Recycling contest. It is great fun for the students and their families and at the same time teaches important lessons. The funds generated by the sale of T-shirts and reusable grocery bags are used to fund student environmental projects, and their eco-themed booth at the Soro Festival in June.

The school is asking for \$1671 to cover:

- Walk/Bike/Carpool incentives (craft supplies: pencils, stickers, bags) \$455

- Booth equipment (EZ-up canopies) \$351

- Eco Fair Food \$470

- Eco Fair Wireless P.A. system \$341

Full Proposal

A SORO resident, approached the Green Team proposing that if we would plant 7 Koelreuteria bipinnata in empty tree boxes and where dead trees currently exist, he would water and maintain them for two years. Koelreuteria bipinnata are the type of tree consistent with other living trees along this stretch of Pico Boulevard. TreePeople will supply seven 15 gallon Koelreuterias free of charge.

TREE SUMMARY:

Five boxes would need to be cleared before planting. They are located at:

9800 Pico (Chase Bank, Ficus stump)

8918 Pico (2 Ficus tree trunks cut at 10')

8612 Pico (Tile Shop, dead tree)

8501 Pico (Bank of America, 4' high tree stump)

8500 Pico (Shell Station, space filled with asphalt)

Estimate for removal, Moreno's Five Star Tree Service \$2600.00

Two trees would be planted in empty spaces located at:

8948 Pico (not wide enough for a tree but we can submit for it)

8930 Pico (by Jeff's Sausage)

The Green Team proposes that this money come out of the \$5000 allotted for Phase II of Robertson Tree Planting and previously accounted for in the South Robertson Neighborhood Council's working budget of 2012-2013.

The Green Team will get all city permits and permission from the adjacent businesses.

Proposed Motion

South Robertson Neighborhoods Council will spend up to \$2600 to remove stumps and dead trees from tree boxes along Pico Boulevard between the addresses of 8930 and 9800 Pico Boulevard in order to plant up to 7 Koelreuteria bipinnata trees which are a type consistent with the current live trees in this area of Pico. The trees will be 15-gallon size and provided free by TreePeople. They will be cared for up to two years by a resident. The Green Team will pull the proper permits and get permission from the business owners.



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Motion to support proposed Koretz Medical Marijuana Dispensary ordinance

Full Proposal

The title of this motion is a slight misnomer. At the time of this writing, the City Council has instructed the City Attorney to shift from writing an ordinance to drafting a voter initiative. Nevertheless, this motion seeks to identify key aspects of a medical marijuana dispensary law that would best serve SORO and have enough general support to pass in a City-wide election.

Striking a delicate balance

It is important to understand that marijuana is illegal in the United States. It is classified as a Schedule I drug, which means the Federal government regards it as dangerous and does not recognize any legitimate medical uses.

California law cannot over-ride Federal law. The solution, therefore, was to restrict State law enforcement from enforcing or prosecuting the Federal law. Twice, the voters of California approved measures *decriminalizing* possession and cultivation of medical marijuana within certain parameters (the Compassionate Use Act (CUA) and the Medical Marijuana Program Act (MMPA)). Both acts sought to balance safe access to medicine with general public safety. Neither were clear on the subject of distribution.

It is important to note that this motion does not question the medical benefits of marijuana or the right of patients to have access to treatment.

Inability to regulate

As some dispensaries have proven, it is possible to operate responsibly and legally, in partnership with the business community. Unfortunately many do not, and efforts to-date at self-regulation within the medical marijuana community have failed. A large percentage makes no effort to even pretend to operate as non-profit entities. Sadly, the current boom is not driven by a desire to improve patient access—arguably, one or two dispensaries in the area would do that—but too often by pure greed.

The City of Los Angeles passed an ordinance in January 2010 that, among other things, restricted dispensaries from opening within 1,000 feet of schools, parks, libraries and each other. However, a recent ruling (*Pack v. City of Long Beach, 4* October 2011) by the 2nd District Court of Appeal effectively invalidated any city ordinance that creates a permitting process for collectives or otherwise explicitly authorizes them to exist.

Calling a time out

The Appellate Court ruling in *Pack* conflicts with other rulings (including one in November 2011 by the 4th District Court) and a law passed in September 2011 by the State of California (AB 1300) that authorized cities to use criminal and civil penalties to regulate the establishment, location and operation of medical marijuana





collectives. The hope is that the State Supreme Court will hear the *Pack* case and overturn it. However, a decision is not expected for a year or more—and the outcome is far from certain.

The City Council passed an interim ban on dispensaries in July 2012, a temporary measure they felt could withstand legal challenges. In response, the medical marijuana community filed for a voter referendum to block the ban. In order to avoid a ballot measure, the Council rescinded its ordinance. Once again, we have no ordinances governing dispensaries. For now, the balance between access and safety sought by the CUA and MMPA is lost.

Special Assistant City Attorney Jane Usher has proposed another legal approach: limited immunity. In essence, it follows the State law in that it acknowledges that marijuana is illegal, but establishes a series of conditions for dispensaries under which the City will not enforce that law. Roughly speaking, the original approach consisted of three parts:

- 1. All dispensaries are banned.
- However, if a non-profit business meets certain filtering criteria (open before Sept. 2007, has kept a valid tax registration certificate, has been in continuous operation, etc.), the City will not enforce part 1. This set of filters could reduce the number of dispensaries, depending on how they're written.
- 3. These immune businesses must also comply with a set of operating parameters. They would also be phrased in the negative: cannot be open between X pm and X am, cannot have an entrance or exit that faces residential homes, cannot be within X distance of another immune business or sensitive uses, etc. Again, these vary from proposal to proposal.

It is not clear if this tack will withstand legal challenges, but it does seem to address most of the concerns expressed in Appellate Court rulings. To date, two voter initiatives have qualified for the May 2013 ballot based on this approach. If passed by voters, they become law and cannot be modified by the City Council.

MM Initiative 1

The Greater Los Angeles Collective Alliance (GLACA), Americans for Safe Access, and UFCW Local 770 have come together as the "Committee to Protect Patients and Neighborhoods" to draft an initiative that is somewhat reflective of the City's 2010 ordinance.

It does not allow new dispensaries to open. However, it does differ in several key aspects:

- Its set of filters is looser. Existing dispensaries only have to qualify for two out of three criteria.
- It provides more flexibility for dispensaries that have closed temporarily while relocating or in response to a Federal warning.
- While it prohibits dispensaries within 1000' of schools, it does allow a smaller 600' radius for other sensitive uses. There is no limit placed on proximity to other dispensaries. It also gives dispensaries 300 days to relocate if there is a conflict
- Many of the operating parameters are described as infractions, with no specified recourse for violations. This includes allowing minors on the premises.
- It does not specifically prohibit consumption in parking lots





- It adds several new items as infractions, including a requirement for closed circuit security cameras and security guards, and a prohibition against "noxious fumes."
- It allows portions of the initiative to be overturned by the Court without invalidating the entire ordinance ("severability").

In addition, some feel that the definition of medical marijuana collective in the initiative contains a loophole that could be used to keep virtually all of the dispensaries open and unregulated.

MM Initiative 2

The second qualified initiative (sometimes referred to as the "Welch Initiative" after the attorney representing the group sponsoring it) is less influenced by the 2010 City ordinance.

- It proposes a 6% City tax on gross MMD receipts. Curiously, it is worth noting
 that some supporting this initiative had previously sued to invalidate Measure
 M, which sought to tax dispensaries.
- The measure would not cover locations zoned for residential use, leading some critics to worry that it would lead to the proliferation of unregulated "home-based" collectives.
- It places no limits on the number of dispensaries, nor prohibits new dispensaries from opening.
- It does not allow dispensaries within 1000' of schools, but sets the distance at 500' from other sensitive uses (including other dispensaries).
- Hours are set at 10am to 10pm
- The initiative requires testing of marijuana for pesticides and contaminants. It does not specify how often testing be done, nor any official reporting of the results.
- Like MM Initiative 1, it allows portions to be declared legally invalid without tossing out the entire ordinance.

Council Member Paul Koretz was drafting his own "limited immunity" motion when these initiatives qualified for the ballot. On January 16, the City Council directed the City Attorney to prepare a third initiative for the ballot based on CM Koretz's work. The City initiative must be completed and approved by the Council by January 31 in order to be included.

Differences between the Koretz draft ordinance and MM1 & 2 initiatives Although far from final, the Koretz draft is the most restrictive of the three.

- The definition of what constitutes a dispensary is tighter
- The filters for limiting the number of dispensaries are very restrictive; depending on interpretation, they may only allow for less than 50.
- There is no exception made for dispensaries that had to close temporarily in the past five years; they would be not be allowed under this plan.
- Violations of the operating parameters would be cause for closure.
- Dispensaries would be prevented from operating within 1000' of all sensitive uses, the distance stipulated in the 2010 ordinance. (This was subject to some debate at the time. State law sets it at 600'. Some also argued that 1000' reduced the number of available locations to an impractical level.)
- It prohibits people from owning or working at two dispensary locations.
- Severability is limited: invalidating any of the filters or operating parameters would scuttle the whole thing.





The argument for compromise

As a practical matter, a May election will almost certainly have a light turnout. A well-organized special interest group may very well be able to pass any initiative it cares to. MM2 has the potential to win if there are no credible alternatives.

But as the two competing initiatives show, the medical marijuana community is not monolithic. The Committee to Protect Patients and Neighborhoods (sponsor of MM1) has worked closely with the City Attorney in the past to find consensus. Given the unfortunate and unintentional flaws in MM1, there is some hope that a City-sponsored compromise initiative may convince MM1 supporters to shift their support, and indeed, members of GLACA have publicly signaled their willingness to do so.

This SORO motion asks for a consistent 1000' radius from sensitive uses. This not only is consistent with the 2010 ordinance, but also avoids the clustering effect that plagues several areas in the City, including our own. Fair distribution of dispensaries reduces the impact on any one area of the City, lessens community opposition, and ensures better access for patients.

This motion argues for filters that cap the total number at no more than 150, which would be one dispensary for every 25,000 residents (an average of one or two dispensaries per NC). Given that the filters would be biased towards dispensaries that have consistently "played by the rules," this seems like an equitable compromise.

As noted, MM1 shifts many of the operating parameters to a list of "infractions." While we see no particular issue with this, we do think that violations should lead to revocation of the dispensary's limited immunity. We leave the specifics open to negotiation.

Proposed Motion

- I. The South Robertson Neighborhoods Council recognizes the benefits of medical marijuana for the seriously ill and the expressed desire of California voters to decriminalize possession and cultivation for medical purposes.
- II. To that end, the NC officially supports the creation of a City Council-sponsored voter initiative for limited immunity for qualified dispensaries with Council Member Koretz's draft ordinance of January 2013 as a starting point. It is the express hope of the NC that the initiative provisions be developed with significant input from the Committee to Protect Patients and Neighborhoods in order to create a compromise proposal.
- III. In line with the 2010 City ordinance, however, the NC does specifically urge the City Council in creating this ballot initiative to maintain a 1000' exclusion radius (measured property line to property line) for sensitive uses (including schools up to grade 12, parks, libraries, religious institutions, accredited child care institutions, youth centers, rehabilitation centers and other dispensaries), excepting licensed residential medical or elder care facilities; an effective initial limitation on immune dispensaries of no more than 150 City-wide; a prohibition on marijuana consumption on premises (including parking lots); no unaccompanied minors on premises; no employees, managers, owners or volunteers who have failed an annual LAPD LiveScan background check; with the exception of emergencies, no ingress or egress from doors abutting residential areas (which must be kept locked from the exterior at all times); and an effective limitation on operating hours to 10am to 8pm.





IV. The NC asks for specific recourse and penalties for violations of operating parameters, up to and including criminal charges and revocation of the dispensary's limited immunity.

The NC authorizes a community impact statement to this effect, as well as communication of the NC's position to governmental leaders and press.

Full Proposal

On January 4, 2013 the Los Angeles City Council, without any warning or advance notice, introduced a motion to place a three billion dollar bond measure on the May ballot. They did this without any input from the Public or the Neighborhood Councils that represent the stakeholders that will have to shoulder the eventual burden of a possible six billion dollar tab.

On January 5, 2013 Los Angeles Neighborhood Council Coalition, a Coalition of Councils, drafted a motion that asked the 95 NCs to send a message to the City Council that would allow NCs to have 60 days to have an opportunity to weigh in on the motion. Although this is a systemic problem with the City Council, we need to take the first step and address the current issue at hand. A LANCC committee, with NC participation, will be set up to deal with the far reaching problem of the lack of transparency and stakeholder participation from City Council.



Full Proposal
