

The existing 1,621 Sq Ft 24-hour gas station at 9779 W Pico Blvd does not presently have the ability to sell beer and wine. The team requested a conditional use permit to allow the sale of beer and wine within a remodeled 24-hour market with a gas station, in lieu of restricted hours (7:00 to 11:00pm) as required, at the Land Use Committee's September 1, 2020 meeting.

The subject property, located at the intersection of Pico & Beverwil, , across from Roxbury Park. The adjacent properties consist of 2- to 4-story multi-unit apartment buildings.

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
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Motion to reconsider establishment of a standing rule regarding appointment of replacement members with ballots of more than 10 people

Background

On September 17, 2020, the South Robertson Neighborhoods Council General Board approved Agenda Item GB091720-06, a motion to establish a standing rule regarding appointment of replacement members with ballots of more than 10 people. While the motion was passed, it created a standing rule that directly conflicts with the bylaws and led to at least one grievance filed with the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment.

When Bylaws and standing rules conflict, the bylaws control. Therefore, this standing rule, despite its use in the September 17th meeting, should not apply and its presence causes unnecessary confusion. Furthermore, per a recommendation from DONE, the Council should attempt to remove this standing rule to avoid the presence of a conflict in the future and if this is a rule that should be put into place, it should be passed as a bylaw.

This motion does not address the actual vote taken based on this rule, but focuses solely on the passage of the standing rule itself and its attempted future use.

Proposed Motion

I. With reference to the motion passed on September 17, 2020, under agenda item GB091720-06, SORO NC should reconsider the standing rule and have it removed from the record to avoid confusion due to its inapplicability as a result of its direct contradiction to the bylaws.

Considerations

The rule creates confusion since it contradicts the bylaws, and when a conflict arises between standing rules and bylaws, the bylaws apply.

It is likely to cause another improper vote in the future and subsequently opens the SORO NC to a future grievance.

Arguments against:

Since the bylaws overrule the standing rule, there is no reason to remove this rule since it doesn't apply.

The purpose of this rule was helpful given the large candidate pool and should be used to make bylaw changes.

Cut through traffic is a constant issue within SORO, making our streets less safe and peaceful. Safe streets are all the more important during this pandemic, as many more people are walking, running, and biking our streets, and our sidewalks are not wide enough to allow people to do so while maintaining recommended social distance guidelines.

The City of Los Angeles recently implemented Slow Streets in streets near SORO, such as Palms. 1 By putting up temporary barriers at intersections asking cars to slow down and not cut through, this Slow Streets program has successfully led to many of our streets being calmer and having less cars, making them safer to walk, run, bike and scoot.2

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



Background

A recent DONE survey (Survey) explored methods to develop and support alternatives to armed crisis response. Additionally, the California Assembly passed AB-2054 "Emergency services: Community Response: Grant Program" (Assembly Bill).

The creation of a City Council file would discuss those alternatives, including revamping the City of Los Angeles 911 system. The 911 system should have a call option so that there are three options: Option 1 police, Option 2 fire/ems, and Option 3 Community Assistance Liaison Team. Option 3 would be created to meet the demands for an alternative to arm crisis response for homelessness, domestic violence, neighbor disputes, and other quality of life issues.

Proposed Motion

Background

The project team presented this project to the Land Use Committee at their September 1, 2020 meeting. The project consists of 64 dwelling units for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, including 7 units for Very Low Income household occupancy. The application includes the following entitlement requests.

- To allow a reduction in the rear yard from 18 feet to 14 feet and 4 inches.
- To allow an increase in Floor Area Ratio to 3.85:1.
- To allow an increase in building height from 45 feet to 76 feet and 2 inches.
 To allow a waiver of Development Standards to provide 12 residential parking spaces in lieu of the otherwise required 64 pursuant to LAMC
- To allow a Master Conditional Use Permit (alcohol)

The subject property, located at 9224 W Pico Blvd + 1410 S Glenville Dr, is at the heart of Pico-Robertson. The adjacent properties consist of 1-story businesses, some of which are non-operative.

The subject property is 17,600 square feet. The proposed building is 6 stories. Despite several entitlement requests, the project is worthwhile because it creates density without displacing current residents. It also offers housing for the intellectually and developmentally disabled population, an underserved community with low access to support, amenities, and career options. The additional floor area provides support services including communal living and dining spaces, education and training spaces, support staff space, and ample open space amenities for residents. The project is setting aside more than the required 11% of base density for Very Low Income housing units. The parking requirement waiver is due to the residents for this building being unable to operate vehicles and therefore not needing as much parking as is required. In addition to the housing, this building offers ground floor retail and restaurant space (9,500 sq ft) that provides job opportunities within the IDD population. The dining opportunity proposed was a community food hall, which would provide a positive street-level experience.

The applicant noticed residents within 500 feet of the property for the Land Use Committee meeting. There were very few residents in attendance.

The Land Use Committee voted unanimously to recommend the General Board support the project.
